

Jesus A Savior without borders

esus needed a break. A time to recharge physically and spiritually. For peace and quiet he crossed the border and headed for a place of refuge. He went to Tyre, a city of Syria. But Mark chapter 7 tells us that things did not quite work out as planned. Mark 7: 24-28 – "He entered a house and did not want anyone to know it; yet he could not keep his presence secret. In fact, as soon as she heard about him, a woman whose little daughter was possessed by an impure spirit came and fell at his feet. The woman was a Greek, born in Syrian Phoenicia.

She begged Jesus to drive the demon out of her daughter. "First let the children eat all they want," he told her, "for it is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs." "Lord," she replied, "even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs."

As a reminder of the Jews history with the Syrians, like the prodigal son, Israel, the northern kingdom, blew its inheritance by turning away from their loving father. They threw caution to the wind and joined those who lived for the moment. Unlike the prodigal son however, they did not repent and, as a result, suffered the consequences of their sin. Assyria conquered them and dispersed the Jews. Then other ethnic groups moved in. This happened 700 years before the story told in Mark 7. To put Jesus' reference to dogs into context, dogs, according to the Bible Concordia, represented cruel enemies or a term of reproach or of humility in speaking of one's self. During Jesus time on earth, the Jews of the southern kingdom were under the rule of Rome. They were granted self-rule under the watchful eye of Rome. They looked forward to the Messiah coming in power and restoring their lands.



They resented all aliens who occupied their former land.

We learn the rest of the story in Mark 7: 29 - "Then he told her, "For such a reply, you may go; the demon has left your daughter."

There are two lessons we can learn here:


Lesson #1: Jesus is not a political messiah. He tells us that His kingdom is not of this world (political and temporary), but it is eternal and everlasting. Jesus, in one fell swoop, did away with prejudice in accordance with his teachings. The mother, out of love for her daughter, recognized Jesus as the Messiah, the savior without borders. She called him Lord. She confessed her unworthiness and at the same time by faith, trusted Jesus to be merciful and heal her daughter.

Lesson #2: Jesus took a break to rest. In his wisdom, God designated the seventh day as a day of rest and worship to recharge the body and soul.

Hymn 653, vs. 1 and 2: "In Christ There Is No East or West"

In Christ there is no east or west, in him no south or north, but one great fellowship of love throughout the whole wide earth.

With God there is no tribe or race, in Him we all are one, He loves us as his children, through our faith in his dear son.




BEHOLD THE MAN!



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GRACE equips new witnesses of Jesus

ccording to the dictionary, a witness is a person who gives testimony about something they know as truthful. For example, someone who sees a car accident can give a testimony to the police of what he saw happen.

As Christians we have the mission of giving testimony of something more important than anything else. We're called to testify of the One we know is the truth, the One who gives us life, salvation, and forgiveness of sins, the One who died for us on the cross: JESUS. He invites us to tell others about Him, and about what He did, does, and will do in the lives of those who believe in Him. We give testimony of the truth, and we proclaim His truth... that's why we are His Witnesses.

"Everyone His Witness" is a six weeks workshop prepared by the

Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod that seeks to equip our people to be witnesses of Jesus, and be involved in the fantastic and important task of telling others about the work of Jesus to save the entire human race.

MISSION SUNDAY

During this Sunday, we collected a special offering to support our missions, and Pastor Novelli informed that a new Mission Sunday will take place in August, when we will announce new mission partnerships with other groups and missionaries.

As a Christian community, we are committed to giving testimony of Jesus in our neighborhoods, city, and the whole world, through the proclamation of the gospel and works of mercy and love. recently heard that a friend's 20-something daughter had moved to another city. In her first few weeks there, she decided she would give the local Lutheran church a try. Her verdict? The church wasn't much to her liking because the only people there were "old people."

On the one hand, I can understand this young woman's hesitancy to return. We all like to be surrounded by our generational peers. It's more comfortable. Friends and even potential spouses are easier to find among a large group of people close to one's own age. Nobody wants to be a part of what they think is an

old or dying organization. Some — for right or for wrong — come to church for an energizing faith boost. When they look around and see mainly gray or white heads, they may (especially if they are young or in the prime of life) feel less than energized and want to look elsewhere.

In a recent study by LifeWay Research, young adults reported that the number one reason they stop attending church is because their life situation has changed. They may go to college or simply move away from home. Out from under Mom and Dad's roof, they have the freedom to sleep in on Sunday morning, and so they do. In light of this,

I give my young friend a great deal of credit for at least giving a church in her new city a chance.

What if, however, she had decided to go back the next week? Then the week after that? And the week after that? What might she have found? How could she have contributed to a fellowship of mostly older people? What might the members of that congregation have done for her?

Suggestions for a younger person

If you're a younger person entering a church with mostly older people, I encourage you to give it at least a few months. Make an effort to get to know the people in the church. Listen to their faith

stories. Watch the ways in which they live out their Christianity. Sit around a table with them at a Bible study. Listen closely for words of wisdom. See if they don't love you in ways you never expected. Bring your youthful energy. Volunteer to help out in ways that might be difficult for those who are older. Bring some friends along with you and introduce them to the members of the church. Ask the pastor how you can help him. Lead a Vacation Bible School or help start a food pantry. Give of yourself — and see just how much you receive.

Suggestions for an older person

If you're an older person who is a member of church made up of mostly older people, and you see a young person walk through the door, welcome her or him with open arms. Introduce her to your friends. Make sure the pastor knows his name. Don't overwhelm her but do encourage her to stick around for

coffee hour. Tell him about the history of your church and let him know how he can get involved.

Don't make a fuss if she brings her mocha latte into the sanctuary. Don't give him a sour look if he's wearing jeans.

Make an effort to get to know the personal details of her life. Show that you care about his vocation and relationships. Get her cell phone number and surprise her with an encouraging text message in the middle of the week. Listen to his ideas about ways to enhance the life of the congregation. Give of yourself — and see just how much you receive.

Embracing the generation gap

Instead of just bridging the church generation gap, what if we embraced it? From both sides? What if both young and old took on the attitude that we can learn from those of the other generation and be enriched by them? What if we cared less about ourselves — our needs, our

preferences — and just a little bit more about the others sitting in the pews near us?

What if we all took heed of the words from Proverbs 20:29: "The glory of young men is their strength, but the splendor of old men is their gray hair"? What if we lived out Psalm 148:12-13: "Young men and maidens together, old men and children! Let them praise the name of the Lord, for his name is exalted; his majesty is above earth and heaven"?
